I. The Example of Paul.

He had succeeded in working faith in their hearts and in strengthening this faith to the present state of growth in That was a pleasing sacrifice in the sight of God. Numbers 15:7 And for a drink offering thou shalt offer the third part of an hin of wine, for a sweet savour unto the LORD.
Wine is a symbol of in Scripture. The pouring of wine on the Old Testament sacrifice taught the truth that the way of sacrifice is the way of joy. This truth is what Paul was teaching these Philippians.

### II. The Example of Timothy.

Philippians 2:19-20.
Paul wanted to send Timothy to the Philippians; but only if it was in the will of Jesus Christ. All of his plans and purposes centered in
A. His background.
Timothy was one of the better known of Paul's companions. His mother and grandmother were godly Jewish women; and gave him a good of the Old Testament Scriptures.
2Timothy 1:5 When I call to remembrance the unfeigned faith that is in thee, which dwelt first in thy grandmother Lois, and thy mother Eunice; and I am persuaded that in thee also.
2Timothy 3:14-15 But continue thou in the things which thou hast learned and hast been assured of, knowing of whom thou hast learned them; 15 And that from a child thou hast known the holy scriptures, which are able to make thee wise unto salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus.
Timothy was Paul's child in the faith and seems to have been converted at the time of Paul's missionary visit to Lystra and Iconium. Timothy's father was a; Paul circumcised him to make him more acceptable to the Jews; for Paul would always approach the synagogue congregation first when he entered a new town. His recommendation of Timothy shows the intimacy of feeling between these two men, a cordial relation which the difference in in no way affected them.
According to Eusebius, Timothy was the first bishop of Ephesus. The Bible does not tell us how he died; but historical tradition states that he was clubbed to death at a for preaching the Gospel and for denouncing the licentiousness.

Timothy was with Paul, and therefore felt the same pure, cordial interest in the Philippians as did his teacher, since he was just as anxiously concerned about the work of Christ. Timothy's solicitude for the Philippians was genuine, sincere, just as Paul's was. Men who think like Pau are rare in any age. Philippians 2:25-26 Yet I supposed it necessary to send to you Epaphroditus, my brother, and companion in labour, and fellowsoldier, but your messenger, and he that ministered to my wants. 26 For he longed after you all, and was full of heaviness, because that ye had heard that he had been sick.
Epaphroditus' name means "" If ever a man breathed the spirit of helpfulness, it was this man. He was from Philippi, and was a member of the church there. He had been employed by the Philippians to carry relief to Paul when he was in, and while in Rome he was taken dangerously sick. News of this had been conveyed to Philippi, and again intelligence had been brought to him that they heard of his sickness and that they were much affected by it. Upon his recovery, Paul thought it best that he should return at once to Philippi, and doubtless sent this by him. He is much commended by Paul for his and These high words of praise for Epaphroditus came from a man who maintained lofty standards for servants and soldiers of the Lord.
A. A brother.
Paul would refer to Timothy as a son, and to Epaphroditus as a brother. The new birth puts all Christians on the level of family.

Philippians 2:26 For he longed after you all, and was full of heaviness, because that ye had heard that he had been sick.
Epaphroditus was not depressed because he was sick, away from home, and among strangers. What burdened him was his concern for family and friends who would worry about him. He did not want others to be
Philippians 2:27 For indeed he was sick nigh unto death: but God had mercy on him; and not on him only, but on me also, lest I should have sorrow upon sorrow.
E. A near death experience.
Note: The fevers that were prevalent in Rome, due to malaria borne by mosquitoes from near-by swamps ravaged the populace; and would be hazardous to visitors with little or no immunity.

Philippians 2:30 Because for the work of Christ he was nigh unto death, not regarding his life, to supply your lack of service toward me.

While we do not know what his sickness was the context seems to indicate his condition was due to over \_\_\_\_\_ rather than persecution or hazards of the journey.

Epaphroditus is sent with a high recommendation for the apostle to be received with joy and respect and honor for his work in the ministry.
